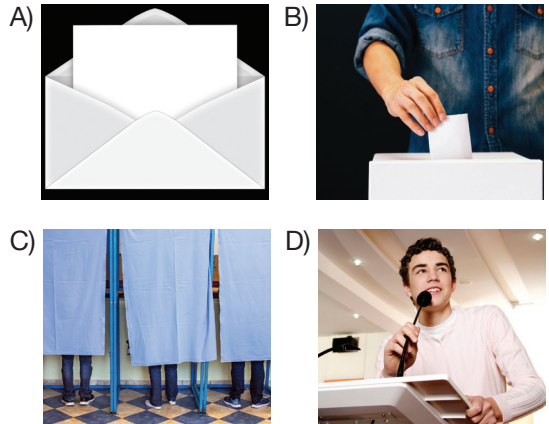

Hello! My name is Maurice. I want to be the new school president because I want more after-school activities like music or language lessons.

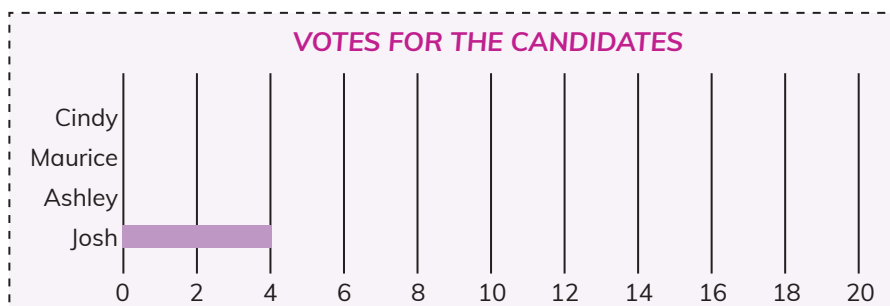
Hello! I'm Cindy. I'm a candidate because I want to make a change in this school. We should have recycling bins in the classrooms and we should organize school events to plant trees.
